This is to Certify that I have examined the Refrigerated Cargo Installation of the above named ship as stated below for a Loading Port Survey as required by the Society's Rules.

The installation is classed with the Society and has the survey record of + LLOYD'S RMC (RS) 4.61 in the latest Supplement to the Register Book available at this Port. A certificate on board dated 7. 4. 62 and 14. 4. 62 issued at the Port of Durban & Beira states that a later record of + LLOYD'S RMC (RS) 4.62 has been recommended.

The chambers specified overleaf and their equipment, together with the refrigerating plant under working conditions, have been examined by me in accordance with the requirements of the above-mentioned Rules, and in my opinion, are in a fit and efficient condition.

I have transmitted to the Committee of Lloyd's Register of Shipping, London, a Report stating that all recommendations made by me have been completed to my satisfaction.

Before loading was commenced, the temperature of the cargo chambers was reduced as shown overleaf.
