

Surveyed the Steel Single Screw Steamer "OTTENHOUND", 860 tons gross, of Saint John, N. B., while in drydock at Saint John, N. B. on the 1st August, 1952 and subsequent dates, on account of DAMAGE stated sustained by vessel striking submerged object in Saint John Harbour when leaving the Irving Oil Wharf for Halifax, N. B. on the 1st August, 1952,

and that I have transmitted to the Committee of Lloyd's Register of Shipping, London, a Report, stating that all repairs recommended by me have been completed to my satisfaction, and

that I have Recommended* that she be continued as classed, with fresh record of DOCKING 8,52, subject to indented keel and bottom plating (p.s.a.) being dealt with by the Special Survey, and to sternframe solepiece (R.F. 8,52) being specially examined at the next drydocking. Also, subject, as previously recommended, to indented side shell plating etc. (p & s) being dealt with at the Special Survey,

being fit to carry Petroleum in bulk.



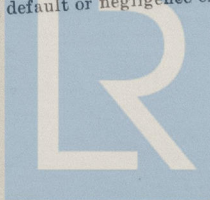
