

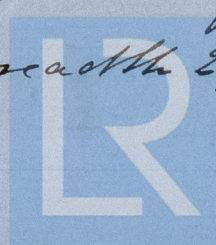

With reference to the Ship
"Ann Wilton" see Secretary's letter and mins

I beg to acquaint you that, at the
further request of the owner I saw the vessel
Whilst-loading at Cardiff, and herewith
forward you the correspondence relative
thereto, with a view to facilitate the
relaxation of the Rule if possible as regards
the stripping of the copper so recently
put on, also data taken from the Ships
Register together with some other observations
made on the spot: viz; - Built at
Pembroke in the United States of America
in the year 1854.

Fastenings to Hold Beams

Double lodging pieces of wood in each space and 9 pair of iron pieces fitted to the lower side of beam extending down to floors.

A shelf fitted $\frac{3}{4}$ length of each amidships 14×9 and a waterway above the beam all fore & aft 12×8 .

Deck beams, double lodging pieces in each space of wood and 7 pair of iron pieces fitted to the lower side of beam together with 10 pair of wood standard pieces, banded in the turn of the throat with iron.

The half beams fitted in proper cuttings

The general appearance so far as externally seen by me is very good, also the shear of the vessel, but found wood sheathing under the copper up to the wales, hence my letter of enquiry to Mr Wright as per copy inclosed.

This vessel, it is stated, never was classed! The accompanying Papers differ as whether or not the Yellow Baital Sheathing newly put on at this Oct^r 7/40 (previous to present Owners purchase) extends on the Wood Sheathing in question said to be put on at Liverpool as back as 1852, and as it appears the Owners never intended to have her finally Surmised for Classification until her return home to Carraig in the Autumn; The whole subject has better be deferred till a proper Survey is held on the vessel and reported upon as usual. The Ship's Surmises may know something of the vessel.
