FIG. 1. Position of the Anchor when canted.

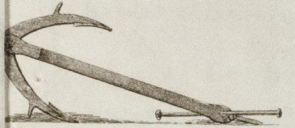


FIG. 2. Shows the action of the toggle, which has brought the under pea from the shank to the ground, in the position to enter.

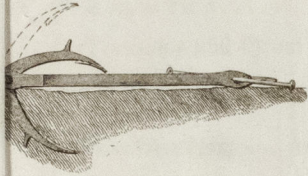
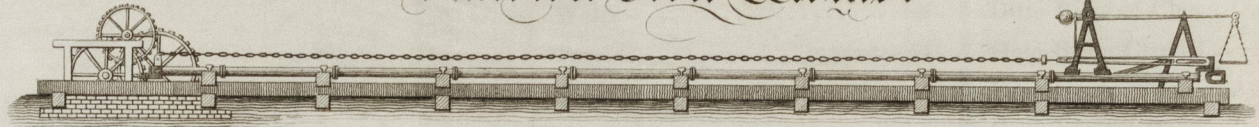


FIG. 3. View of the Anchor in the ground, with the upper pea on the shank, in which position it remains. A dotted line shows the position in which the upper pea of a common anchor would be if placed by its side.
