I am in receipt of your telegram acquainting me that the New ropes required for the S.S. Deerhound are not yet placed on board. In Mr. Vincent's letter dated the 5<sup>th</sup> inst, he said they would be placed on board on her arrival at Liverpool this time, and also said you did not intend sending them on by rail or buy them at Falmouth, for either way it would be more expensive. It will be more expensive if you let her run out of class for want of them, he made quite an uncalculated remark that ship owners do not often make, that is if they were condemned in the first place they would have been put on board at Falmouth some time. Must be left until last, but there was plenty of time to get them here after they were condemned it was day before she went to dry dock.
