Sir -

We beg respectfully to inform you that the composite ship "Autum" 2017 tons, has been placed in dry dock for the purpose of receiving further survey with a view to classification, of which we offer the following report:-

The yellow metal sheathing was quite fair, and free from stainle; the hold was cleared, the ceilings nearly all taken up, and the inner surface of the bottom planking exposed, in places, by the removal of the cement; a few galvanized bolts (half inch diam. with hexagonal nuts) driven out, and found badly wasted; several iron bolts (three quarters inch) were also driven out of the timbers of the top side and one, (one inch,) from the lower deck waterway, all of which proved good -

With four inches of camber on the blocks -  
we found three inches round up to the  
line of the keel between the  
fore and main masts, and a depression  
of one and a quarter inches. by the sights  
fore and aft on deck; the lower side of  
the keel has been made fair. probably  
at the time when the side stringers on  
the upper and lower deck beams were  
increased, the strakes of deck over these  
(then screwed) show their butts in good  
order, as compared with some of the  
original ones abreast of them, thus  
indicating that the deformity took place  
previous to her late repairs. -

As some parts of the frame in the  
bottom have been renewed, the efficiency  
of the connection of these, should be  
ascertained when all the cement is  
removed -

The yellow metal sheathing has now  
been stripped, and the ship taken out  
of dry dock, in order to proceed to the  
Clyde for repairs. -

We beg to append a copy of our recommen-  
-dations which were made to the owners -  
after the above survey. -
