REPORT of SURVEY for REPAIRS.

REPAIRS. At present on patent slip. The whole of the ceiling planks removed, coal bunker cleared, inner surface of plating exposed to view, all oxidation removed by being beaten and scraped off, also from the outside plating. Boiler raised. Four plates of the starboard strakes 10 feet long, and two short plates, four plates in flat replaced with new 8/16 & 6/16. In butt treble riveted, one plate on each side of stem doubled with 3/8 plate about 4 1/2 feet long, a great many rivets in keel, and in flat of bottom replaced with new. Two angle irons 18 feet long, replaced with new 3 1/2 x 6/16 in on middle line keelson, and a plate 12 feet long 5 1/2 x 8/16 riveted on top, a number of new deck planks, and nearly all new ceiling. Deck caulked.

Flat of floor to turn of bilge all fore and aft inside Portland cemented, abra this together with the entire outside coated twice with Lead Paint, one coat preparatory and one of McQuiness green paint, from heel to light water line.
