

Ship Rangitiki.

Extract from letter dated 27th Nov /90.

On the 19th Nov /90 at Napier this vessel parted from her anchors at 60 fathoms, the sea is reported heavy, with a heavy swell, the second anchor was let go and 120 fathoms of chain, after riding at this for about three hours the chain parted at 60 fathoms, she was afterwards brought up with the 3rd anchor about 200 yards from breakers, and afterwards towed into safety by two small steamers, the owners of which claim £1000 salvage.

The Surveyor mentions that three other Sailing Ships were riding close to, with about 60 fathoms, one, the "Balclutha" N. 35 in Rig Boat was riding in ballast safely and 60 fathoms of chain out. The Surveyor measured the chain still left on board the Rangitiki & found it to measure from $1\frac{8}{10}$ to $1\frac{12}{10}$ and he considers that with a long scope of 120 fathoms of chain out the vessel should have ridden imperfectly, and he recommends that if the lost chain are recovered they should be thoroughly overhauled when the ship reaches London -

In a letter from Napier dated 26th Decr /90 the Surveyor reports that the Ship Rangitiki on the 5th Decr /90 with a strong breeze off the land and smooth water parted from 75 fathoms at the Government Buoy and came in contact with the ship "Balclutha" doing considerable damage to the latter bulwarks and her own rudder. She then anchored with 125 fathoms of chain and after about four hours she parted her chain about 60 fathoms drifting out to sea. Afterwards the S.S. "Mataura" towed her to the Buoy where she was made fast with coil hawsers & afterwards towed to Wellington.

The vessel appears to have lost 3 Bower anchors and all her Chain cable with the exception of 90 fathoms, and to complete the equipment at Wellington the best anchors & chains available in the Colony were supplied of the following weights

The Surveyor in his letter dated 26th Decr/90 says "I will not trust to her chains but see that she is made fast with Cours Hawser" and mentions that during the trouble with this ship ^{from} the other vessels in the bay had been riding in safety with 60 to 75 fathoms of chain out; thus showing that the Rangitiki's chains were decidedly defective as she parted from them 5 times.

As no report appears to have come to hand as yet from the Surveyors at Napier or Wellington and as no mention is made in the letters about refusing to pass the chains for the voyage home thereby subjecting the vessel to considerable delay of which the owners complain ~~and~~ it is submitted —



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
