Dear Sir,

With reference to your letter of the 16th instant ^{alt.} relative to the steamers belonging to Messrs. Marius Nielsen & Son, I have to inform you that on Mr. Marius Nielsen's return I had an interview with him where also his superintendent was present.

I was informed by them that besides the "SIGRID" the steamers "Karen", "Margrethe" and "Thyra" were now being transferred to Bureau Veritas class, but that no action would be taken with regard to the remaining vessels classed with our Society.

As mentioned in our letter of the 11th instant we have never had any complaints from the owners or their superintendent as regards the way in which the work was carried out by our surveyors, and the only explanation which I could elicit from



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either of the gentlemen was that it was considered to be more economical to have their smaller vessels classed with Bureau Veritas. I have however well founded reasons to believe that these proceedings are due to personal feelings on the part of the superintendent towards the Bureau Veritas, over which we can have no control.
