Dear Mr. Warlow,

With reference to your official letter of yesterday's date, regarding the case of the S.S. "CAMOSUN", it occurs to me to inquire whether you were absolutely compelled to allow the Society's documents to remain in the custody of the Court? When we produce documents in English Courts of Law, the representative of the Society who produces them is accustomed to keep them in his own charge and to attend the Court with them daily so long as the case continues, until he is told that the documents are not likely to be required again. In this way the papers are always kept safely in our own hands and are available if they should be required for other purposes. We always consider that there is risk of our papers, &c., being lost or mislaid among the multiplicity of documents usually incident to a law case.
