NAVEMAR. — London, Jan. 25.— The Italian Official News Agency claims that the Spanish steamer *Navemar*, coming from America with a cargo of vegetables, was torpedoed off Cadiz by a submarine. The entire crew of the *Navemar* perished.— British United Press.

ATTACKS ON SPANISH SHIPPING

Axis Charge of British Torpedoing Denied

The Admiralty yesterday issued an official communiqué denying Axis broadcasts that the Spanish steamer *Navemar* (5473 tons gross) had been torpedoed by a British submarine. It is stated that no British or Allied submarine was at the scene anywhere near the scene of the incident, and so far from being responsible for the attack, the British Admiralty sent two surface warships to search the area, but the majority of the *Navemar*'s crew are stated to have been saved by another Spanish vessel. The text of the communiqué is as follows:

"Another Spanish ship, the steamship *Navemar*, has fallen victim to the Axis U-boats and, as is their practice, the Axis have put out broadcasts asserting that the ship was torpedoed by a British submarine. The Admiralty have previously pointed out in connection with the sinking of the Spanish vessel *Alvarado* that the object of the Axis in making these lying allegations is to create trouble between Britain and Spain. In view of the long record of attacks by Axis U-boats upon neutral merchant ships, it is obvious where to look for the authors of this latest outrage. Nevertheless, the Admiralty state that no British or Allied submarine was at the time anywhere near the scene of the incident."

"The circumstances of the sinking of the Portuguese ship *Corte Real* and the Spanish ships *Badajoz* and *Castillo Oropesa* make it plain that it is the deliberate policy of the Axis to deal ruthlessly with the shipping of the Iberian Peninsula. In each of these three cases the sinking was clearly premeditated, and in the first two the U-boat responsible was identified as German, while the torpedo which sank the *Castillo Oropesa* was subsequently proved to have been of Italian manufacture. This new attack on a ship carrying supplies to Spain from across the Atlantic may indicate that they are now hoping to cut off Spain from all trade with the outside world."

"So far from being responsible for the brutal attack on the steamship *Navemar*, the British Admiralty, mindful of the ready assistance given in the past by the Spanish mercantile marine to British seamen in similar circumstances, diverted two British surface warships to search the area where the *Navemar* was reported to have been attacked. The majority of the crew are now stated to have been saved by another Spanish vessel, so that their relatives have been relieved of the cruel anxiety caused by mendacious Axis reports that the whole crew had been lost."
