and that I have transmitted to the Committee of Lloyd's Register of Shipping, London, a Report, stating that all repairs recommended by me have been completed to my satisfaction, and that I have Recommended that she be

continued as now classed without fresh record of survey, subject to sternframe and rudder being specially examined at first convenient opportunity, being fit to carry, being specially examined at first convenient opportunity, being fit to carry her usual cargoes. The vessel's class is also subject to indented plating (p. & s.) being dealt with, damaged bottom plating, etc. 'tween deck plating at after corner of No. 1 hatch to be dealt with, and both hawse pipes renewed first convenient opportunity; buckled bulkheads of reserve bunker to be dealt with at first convenient opportunity (fire). Renew cargo battens in Nos. 1 & 2 holds, as necessary, at first opportunity.
