The undersigned at the request of Capt Loffeys and
 Messrs Duffell & Co Agents proceeded on board the Barque
 Latona 212 tons of Birminghams lying at anchor in Chago Harbor
 near Port Chalmers and certify that on reference to the
 Log Book we found that the Latona after leaving Timaru
 laden with a full cargo of wheat in bags encountered some
 heavy weather & made much water & were informed that
 at the time the pumps being temporarily choked, there
 was three feet of water in the hold & further that on
 entering this harbor the vessel struck repeatedly on the
 bar with much violence, we found the vessel to be making
 as she lay at anchor, about one inch of water per hour
 on carefully inspecting the hull, outside we found the
 seams, butts & woodwork, with the plating broken & the caulking
 slack, indicating to us that the vessel had been severely
 strained the seams at stanchions & waterways showed signs
 of straining but not to such an extent as the seams on the
 outside of the vessel, especially in the fore & after sections
 of the hull this latter circumstance gave us the impression
 that the straining may have been caused by the heavy
 surge which the Captain says was experienced while
 the vessel was lying at the Timaru Breakwater moored
 forward & aft. After careful inspection & consideration we
 are confidently of opinion that from what we have seen
 above water & the fact of the vessel having struck on
 the bar as reported, & making a considerable quantity of
 water as she now lies in smooth water, the vessel is
 quite unfit to perform her voyage to England in her
 present condition & we therefore recommend that
 the cargo be all discharged & the vessel placed in the
 dry dock for further examination
