A Reuter message from Flushing states that a Dutch motorship has put into that port with 18 members of the crew of the British steamer *Highwave*, whom she has rescued. The *Highwave*, a vessel of 1178 tons gross, built in 1936, is owned by the High Hook Shipping Company, Ltd.

BRITISH SHIP SUNK  
AT ANCHORATTACK BY NEW TYPE OF  
BOMBERFROM OUR SPECIAL CORRESPONDENT  
ROTTERDAM, JAN. 31

Eighteen members of the crew of the British steamer *Highwave* were landed this evening at Flushing by the Dutch steamer *Rian*, which picked them up after the *Highwave* had been sunk by a new type of German bomber.

The *Highwave*, an unarmed vessel, was lying at anchor about 13 miles off the British coast, near a lightship, when a four-engined bomber suddenly swooped down and dropped five bombs, all of which missed their mark. The bomber returned and dropped two further series of five bombs, also without hitting the ship, which it then attacked with a machine-gun, wounding two of the crew. A sixteenth bomb struck the *Highwave*, which sank soon afterwards.

The bomber in question is believed to be a long-range seaplane of the Hamburger Flugzeugbau, and is reported to be an entirely new type, all existing German bombers being fitted with two engines. Its capacity is indicated by the number of bombs dropped.

## "HIGHWAVE"

A Reuter message from Flushing gives details of the sinking of the British steamer *Highwave*, announced in yesterday's LLOYD'S LIST. The *Highwave*, of 1178 tons gross, had neither a gun nor a wireless installation. On Monday, when the vessel was lying 30 miles off the British coast with engine trouble, a German plane circled round the vessel and then proceeded. On Tuesday a plane, stated to be the same one, attacked the vessel, first with machine guns, wounding two of the crew, and then dropped small incendiary bombs and afterwards high explosive. The bridge was shattered, No. 3 hatch stove in, and the foremast went down. Ten bombs were dropped, and the last blew out the side of the ship. The crew of 18 took to the boats, the vessel sinking rapidly and were picked up by the small Dutch motorship *Rian* and landed at Flushing.


