SOURCE OF INFORMATION.

Reuter's Copenhagen correspondent states that the Danish steamer Bogö (1,214 tons), of Copenhagen, on her way from Sweden to Scotland in ballast, struck a mine near the Scottish coast. Some of the crew of 17 were saved by a British trawler.

The Danish steamer Bogö, of 1,214 tons gross, was on a voyage from Sweden to Scotland in ballast when she struck a mine near the Scottish coast. According to a Reuter message from Oslo, some of the crew of 17 were picked up by a British trawler. The Bogö was owned by Mr. Chr. Jensen, of Copenhagen, and was built in 1920 as the Collier by Lloyd Royal Belge (Great Britain, Ltd.) Glasgow.

CREW RESCUED TWICE

Three of crew Danish steamer Bogö, 1,214 tons, mined in North Sea on Sunday have arrived at Kopperick, Norway. They were picked up by British trawler which was bombed and sunk by German plane two days later. They were then rescued by two Swedish ships.
