77 RESCUED FROM MINED SHIP

SINKING SEEN FROM SHORE

Crowds of people on the seashore at an East Coast town yesterday saw the Liverpool steamer Mangalore (8,886 tons) sunk by a mine. The vessel's crew of 77, including 58 coloured men, were all rescued. The Mangalore, owned by Messrs. T. and J. Brocklebank, Limited, was lying at anchor when she was struck by a German drifting mine. An explosion occurred in the engine room, and some of the crew were thrown into the water. Part of the vessel's superstructure could be seen above the water on the shore after she sank. Twenty coloured survivors—the chief steward and 19 coloured seamen—were treated in hospital, and nine were detained. None of the men was seriously injured; they had been hurt by falling furniture when the explosion occurred. The survivors were rescued by a patrol vessel an hour and a half afterwards. The Mangalore had arrived at an East Coast port, where she had discharged the cargo, and was putting out to sea. A relief crew was on board captain W. A. Ison.

Brocklebank Liner "Mangalore" Mined

The Brocklebank liner Mangalore was mined and sunk off the East Coast yesterday. The crew of 77 were landed at a British port; there were no casualties. A steamer of 8886 tons gross, she was built at Glasgow in 1920. The Mangalore is the fifth vessel owned by Thos. & Jno. Brocklebank, Ltd., to become a war loss, the previous ones being the Manar (7242 tons gross), Magdapur (8641 tons), Malabar (7976 tons), and Matra (8003 tons).

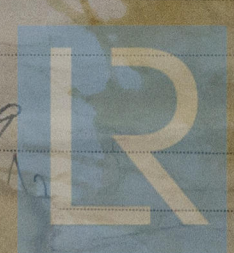
