Précis of particulars of Casualty

This vessel is reported to have been attacked by aircraft in the North Sea on the 13th January, 1940.

She drifted ashore, was full of water, and a month later it was stated she was badly damaged by heavy seas.

In reply to the Casualty Notice the Owners state the vessel has been abandoned as a total loss by all concerned.

SOURCE OF INFORMATION.

"WILLIAM IVEY"

The master and eight members of the crew of the trawler *William Ivey*, of 202 tons gross, have been landed at a Scottish port. The trawler was bombed by a Heinkel bomber in the North Sea. Owned by T. B. Bilton & Sons, Ltd., North Shields, the *William Ivey* was built at Wivenhoe in 1918.

TRAWLER BOMBED

After being machine-gunned and bombed by a German aeroplane, the crew of the North Shields trawler *William Ivey* took to their boat and were picked up six hours later by another North Shields trawler, the *William Purdy*, and were landed at a South-East Scotland port. Charles Blackie, of Eyemouth, the chief engineer, said yesterday that they were attacked at dusk, and the aeroplane flew so low that it almost touched the mast-head.

The British trawler *William Ivey*, which was bombed in the North Sea in January last and subsequently drifted ashore, is now stated to be a total loss.
