Précis of particulars of Casualty This vessel is reported to have broken into two parts in the Atlantic Ocean (lat. 43 30N. long 28W.) on the 9th April, during heavy weather. She was in ballast and nearly all the crew were rescued from the two parts, which were likely to float for several days.

No further reports have been received regarding the forepart, but the after part was observed to be floating on the 20th April, with the stern and propeller out of the water.

No reply has been received to the casualty notice, addressed to the Owners' London Agents on the 28th April.

In reply to inquiry Lloyd's state the Underwriters have accepted this case as a total loss.

MCUNT KYLLENE.—Valentia, Wireless Station, Apr. 9. — Following received from American steamer American Merchant, at 2.32 p.m., G.M.T.: Following received from Greek steamer Mount Kyllene: S.O.S. in lat. 43 30 N., long. 28 W., ship broken in two by explosion, both parts separate. German steamer Europa lat. 47 30 N., long. 29 46 W., working distress.

New York, Apr. 9. — British motor tankers Athel foam and Inverlea are going to the rescue of the crew of the Greek steamer Mount Kyllene, according to wireless messages picked up here from the German steamer Europa. — Reader.

Valentia, Wireless Station, Apr. 10. — Following received from British motor tanker Inverlea at 2.35 a.m., G.M.T.: —
 In approximately lat. 43 47 N., long. 27 30 W., standing by Greek steamer Mount Kyllene, which has broken in two separate parts. Norwegian motor tanker Kain Knudsen has ten survivors. We have five. Two men from one part and fifteen from the other have still to be rescued. Weather bad.

New York, Apr. 10. — Motor tanker Inverlea was unable to take off the other members of the crew of the Greek steamer Mount Kyllene because of the darkness. Motor tanker Athel foam sent a boat to the rescue of the two members of the crew who were in the second section of the vessel. The Inverlea sent a radio stating that she would take off the remainder of the crew at daylight. — Reader.

Valentia, Wireless Station, Apr. 10. — Following received from British motor tanker Inverlea at 4.32 p.m., G.M.T.: Afterpart of Greek steamer Mount Kyllene still about lat. 43 30 N., long. 27 35 W. Forepart of steamer still afloat and bearing about 180 deg., distant six miles from above position. Both parts abandoned by crew and liable to remain afloat several days. Dangerous to navigation.

London, Apr. 9. — The London agents of the owners of the steamer Mount Kyllene state that the vessel is in ballast.

MOUNT KYLLENE.—New York, Apr. 10.—British motor tankers Inverlee and Athelfoam answered the S O S messages sent out by the operator after the Greek steamer Mount Kyllene was torn in two by an explosion. The Norwegian motor tanker Kaia Knudsen also went to the spot. Their combined efforts resulted in the rescue of 29 members of the crew of the Mount Kyllene. The 29 rescued sailors owe their lives to Wireless Operator Papatheodorou, who rigged up an emergency radio set and sent out S O S calls. To-day he was drowned while jumping for a rescue boat. The story of the rescue reached here to-day in a message from the motor tanker Kaia Knudsen: The Mount Kyllene broke in two parts, which separated. Seventeen men were adrift on the forepart and 14 men on the afterpart. The Kaia Knudsen and Inverlee arrived just after dark and sent lifeboats to the forepart as it was about to overturn. They succeeded in getting off 15 of the men, but two more were still left. The Athelfoam sent a boat and got one of the men, but the wireless operator, while jumping for the boat, was drowned. At daylight, to-day all three vessels sent boats to the afterpart of the steamer and got 13 off. Twenty-nine were saved, 14 in the Kaia Knudsen, 11 in the Inverlee, and four in the Athelfoam. The KAIA KNUDSEN lost one lifeboat.—Reuter.

—London, Apr. 11.—The following message has been received from the British motor tanker Inverlee via Valentia Wireless Station, dated Apr. 10: Inverlee resumed voyage at 11 a.m. to-day (Apr. 10) due Amsterdam Apr. 15. Twenty-nine survivors from Greek steamer Mount Kyllene of whom we have 11, motor vessel Kaia Knudsen 14 and motor vessel Athelfoam four. Following four Greeks were drowned: Halkias and Kaitis sailors, Nazos Leontis, trimmer, and Papatheodorou, wireless operator. Believe vessel broke her back in heavy weather. My crew all well. Require one lifeboat and equipment.

—Portishead Wireless Station, Apr. 11.—Following message received from British motor tanker Athelfoam via motor tanker Conus, timed 1 20 p.m., Apr. 10: Delayed 22 hours assisting in rescue of crew Greek steamer Mount Kyllene. Have on board chief engineer and three firemen. Vessel now proceeding London.

—Valentia Wireless Station, Apr. 14.—Following received from Greek steamer Frangoula B. Goulandris at 10 30 p.m., G.M.T.: Passed at 9 p.m., G.M.T., in lat. 44 10 N., long. 28 7 W., wreck of Greek steamer MOUNT KYLLENE, after end of the vessel above water; dangerous to navigation.

LL 16/4

—Portishead Wireless Station, Apr. 15.—Following message received from master of Norwegian motor vessel Heranger at 9 21 p.m., G.M.T.: Passed the wreck of Greek steamer MOUNT KYLLENE at 7 p.m., G.M.T., in lat. 43 59 N., long. 28 54 W. The wreck was floating with the stern 50 ft. out of the water and very dangerous to navigation.

LL 19/4

—Portishead Wireless Station, Apr. 19.—Following received from master of Danish motor vessel Amerika at 4 p.m., G.M.T., to-day: At 3 50 pm. G.M.T., to-day, in lat. 43 9 N., long. 30 48 W., passed drifting wreck of Greek steamer MOUNT KYLLENE, forward ship submerged, stern and propeller out of water, left by crew.

—Portishead Wireless Station, Apr. 20.—Following message received from master of German motor tanker Brake at 9 16 p.m.: Wreck of Greek steamer MOUNT KYLLENE, of Piræus, drifting in lat. 43 9 N., long. 31 22 W., dangerous to all vessels.

MOUNT KYLLENE.—London, Apr. 27.—The owners of the steamer Mount Kyllene state that according to information received from the master and chief engineer there was no explosion on board. The loss was attributable entirely to heavy weather. (See issues of Apr. 11 and 12.)
