Dear Sirs,

R. I have to acquaint you that the steamer "WEARBRIDGE" has been sold for breaking up purposes, and left the Tyne on the 13th instant in tow for Rosyth.

In the circumstances, the case has been submitted to the Committee, who have decided to make a record of "To be broken up" against the vessel's name in the Society's Register Book, and to expunge her class in accordance with the usual practice.

I shall be glad if you will kindly endeavour to ascertain to whom she has been sold and inform them accordingly.

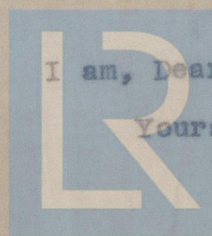
I may add that it is observed from the Shipping Papers that the vessel broke from her tow at Inchkeith, dragged her anchors and went ashore at Kinraig Point, near Elie, on the 15th instant. In the event of her being refloated and arriving at Rosyth, I have to request that you will inform me immediately the work of demolition is commenced.
