This vessel is reported to have
 foundered S.W. of Hook Point, Waterford on
 the 7th December.
 Lloyd's list of 11th December stated that the
 vessel "must have struck rocks running"
 "in. Position hopeless. must be total loss"
 "of ship and cargo. Side exposed at low"
 "water. No chance of salvage. Fear"
 "crew lost".
 The usual notice was sent to the
 Owners on the 12th December, but no
 reply has yet been received.

SOURCE OF INFORMATION.

ST. MARGARET—Cardiff, Dec. 9.—Master of steamer Mungret, from Waterford, reports when leaving river 4 a.m. Dec. 7 sighted inside Hook Light three-masted steamer 400/500 tons, machinery aft, with heavy list to port and almost on beam ends, flying signals of distress. Got tow rope aboard which parted. Vessel subsequently sank with all hands. Unable give any information identity.
 Waterford, Dec. 9.—The steamer reported yesterday sunk 200 yards S.W. of Hook Lighthouse, is reported to be the St. Margaret, of Dublin. Nothing known of the crew. Ship and cargo will equal total loss. (See "Unidentified Casualty" in Lloyd's List of Dec. 9.)
 London, Dec. 9.—Following telegram has been received from the owners: Steamer reported foundered south-west of Hook, Waterford, morning of Dec. 7. This likely to be steamer St. Margaret, although we have no confirmation; she was due Waterford Dec. 7, and no news from master since leaving Troon Friday night (Dec. 6).
 Waterford, Dec. 9.—Steamer, supposed to be St. Margaret, Troon for Waterford, coal, foundered off Hook Point morning of Dec. 7.
ST. MARGARET—Waterford, Dec. 10.—Steamer St. Margaret must have struck rocks running in. Position hopeless, could not be more exposed. Must be total loss of ship and cargo. Side exposed at low water. No chance of salvage. Fear crew lost.—Lloyd's Agent per Salvage Association.
ST. MARGARET—Waterford, Dec. 11.—Steamer St. Margaret: Certainly in about 24 ft. low water. Position could not be worse, no shelter at Hook Point. Will know further to-night. Telegraph morning.—Lloyd's Agent per Salvage Association.
